

The Augusta County Historical Society offices are located in the R.R. Smith Center for History and Art, 20 South New Street, in the heart of the historic district of downtown Staunton. The picturesque Victorian building, built in the late 19th century as the luxurious Eakleton Hotel, houses exhibit galleries, a research library, classrooms, a lecture hall, and offices of the ACHS, the Historic Staunton Foundation, and the Staunton Augusta Art Center.


